Include here references to past events (such as previous property transfers) 4th Dec 1571 - Anne York & her son Peter, had originally granted a 3,000 year lease to their tenant, John Kydd & Katherine (widow of Thomas Kydd, and probably John's mother), of:

- (1) the two messuages in Kilnsey with associated lands, totalling 300 acres, which John Kydd was already occupying.
- (2) Malham Moor in Kilnsey was divided into 25 parts of which John Kydd was granted 2 whole parts plus "2 parts of one part"
- (3) 4 parts plus "3 parts of one part" of Kilnsey Woods (which was divided into 35 parts)

The Yorkes had retained all hunting, fishing & fowling rights

28 January 1572/3 – For £50 John Kydd granted to Richard & Robert Thompson, of Hathorneleyet, a 31 year tenancy (to commence from the next Feast of the Annunciation) of:

- (1) 2 closes at Outgang Close including houses & other buildings
- (2) A small adjoining close (the other side of which lay at the end of Limestonebanck Close)
- (3) Herbage & pannage on the Osteler Intake (which adjoined the upper end of the Outgang Closes)
- (4) 40 beastgates & 10 sheepgates on Kilnsey common pasture
- (5) 2 beastgates on Ox Pasture
- (6) All necessary estovers for the maintenance of the Kilnsey holding (house, hedges, ditches, fencing etc) during their tenancy

For the period of the 31 year tenancy, the Thompsons were to depasture the land, but John Kydd retained the right to take small wood and coppice the Osteler Intake. He was also permitted to take great wood as he intended building a "house" [dwellinghouse or fieldhouse, ie. barn?] with 3 pairs of crucks with white wood, the exact position of the house to be nominated by the Thompsons, who would be responsible for the repair and maintenance of the house, as well as all fences, ditches, etc.

Payments & obligations: Any taxes due to the Crown and the Church. 6s 8d for the Tenths

James Tennant, of Kettlewell, gentleman, and Henry Slynger, of Beggermonds, Langstrothdale, yeoman, promised to stand surety for a sum of £100, on behalf of the Thompsons for the proper fulfilment of the terms of the agreement.
