

Firth & Ellerbank Mills, Skipton: An Introduction to Cotton Manufacturing

A talk by Dr Kenneth Jackson

Historically, in commercial usage, the term 'cotton manufacturing' invariably referred to weaving of yarns from cotton and allied man-made fibres, but not to spinning. After 1865, Skipton was essentially a textile town and remained so until the second half of the twentieth century. Of two principal sectors, cotton manufacturing was the larger, even though sewing thread production at Belle Vue Mills was dominant in terms of visual impact. In this lecture we explore organisational, commercial, technological, and industrial relations aspects of cotton manufacturing using Firth & Ellerbank Mills as a case study.
